AID FOR LIFE

“Without dignity, identity is erased” (Laura Hillenbrand).

In Israel today, one out of four Holocaust survivors lives in need. Those without family suffer from debilitating isolation and loneliness. Many live on fixed incomes and are forced to skip meals. With housing costs rising and social security fixed, others must choose between a roof over their heads and essential medicine.

We believe that as a society we have a moral obligation to ensure that these survivors can live out their remaining years with dignity. As the survivor generation ages, our window of opportunity is closing; thus we must come together now to provide impoverished survivors with the quality of life they deserve.

Latet's Aid for Life program is a holistic approach to improving the lives of the last remaining Holocaust survivors in Israel.

The program includes:

- ♥ Delivery of weekly/monthly food package to every survivor, enabling recipients to eat regular, nutritious meals
- ♥ Improving the social interaction of isolated recipients by pairing them with volunteers for weekly social visits and hosting holiday parties throughout the year
- ♥ Home restorations that creates a safer and more healthful environment which allows recipients to live out their days more independently in their own homes
- ♥ An emergency fund - financial assistance for dental treatment, incontinence products, emergency needs and disability aids
